Sixth Form Behaviour Policy

Here at Cardinal Newman we seek to create an inclusive and caring environment for our pupils by:

- Promoting desired behaviour and discipline
- Promoting self-esteem, self-discipline, proper regard for authority and positive relationships based on mutual respect
- Ensuring equality and fairness of treatment for all
- Encouraging consistency of response to both positive and negative behaviour
- Promoting early intervention
- Providing a safe environment free from disruption, violence, bullying and any form of harassment
- Encouraging a positive relationship with parents and carers to development which involves them in the implementation of the school's policy and procedures
- Promoting a culture of praise and encouragement in which all studer



Creating a professional atmosphere

- Punctuality- All students must be punctual to tutor time and lessons.
- ATTENDANCE- All students will receive weekly updates of attendance, if they fall below 96% attendance this will have a detrimental impact on students' academic progress.
- UNIFORM- We have a formal Sixth Form Dress Code. Blazers/jackets must be worn at all times unless given permission by teachers. Lanyards to be worn at all times.
- STANDARDS- We expect all Sixth Form students to be role mostudents.
- **EQUIPMENT-** Organisation is key to success. All students mus subject folders and homework to tutor period and lessons.



Sixth Form Behaviour Policy: Disciplinary Procedure

There are five stages when it comes to the disciplinary procedure:-

- Stage 1: Verbal Warning 1- and an informal discussion given for unacceptable behaviour. This will be issued by the Head of Sixth Form Miss McHugh or the Sixth Form Co-ordinator Mrs Pears in a meeting where targets will be set.
- Stage 2: Verbal Warning 2 and a letter sent home to parents or carers issued by Miss McHugh outlining the gravity of the misdemeanour Meeting with parents arranged. Targets will be set at the meeting and a time frame for review will be established.
- Stage 3: Written Warning 1- given if a student continues to behave in an
 unacceptable manner despite the verbal warnings. This will involve a formal
 meeting with parents or carers and Senior Assistant Headteacher Mr
 Courtney. At the meeting targets will be set and a time frame for review will
 be established.
- Stage 4: Written Warning 2 given if a student continues to behave in an unacceptable manner despite the Written Warning 1. There will be a formal meeting with Deputy Headteacher Ms Goodwin and a Governor advising that the next sanction will result in Stage 5 and possible removed from roll. The learner may be suspended and the duration of the suspension will depend on the severity of the misconduct.
- Stage 5: If a student continues to behave in an unacceptable manner
 despite the previous interventions there will be a formal meeting with parents
 or carers and the Headteacher Ms O'Connor establishing removal from
 courses and roll.

Examples of behaviour that will result in the BP being followed:

- Punctuality concerns
- Attendance concerns
- ATL concerns
- HL failures
- Poor behaviour
- Misconduct staff/peers.







14. Financial Support Bursary Applications

If you are age 16 to 19 and studying in the sixth form you could get a bursary to help with education-related costs for example: bus fares, text books, folders, school trips etc.

There are 2 types of 16 to 19 Bursary **Higher Award** (Mandatory Award) and **Discretionary Award** (Standard Award):

Higher or Mandatory Award

If one of the following applies to you:

- In care
- · Care Leaver
- Receiving Income Support (IS), or Universal Credit (UC) because they are financially supporting themselves or financially supporting themselves and someone who is dependent on them and living with them such as a child or partner
- Receiving Disability Living Allowance (DLA) or Personal Independence Payments (PIP) in their own right as well as Employment and Support Allowance (ESA) or UC in their own right

Discretionary Bursary (Standard Award)

You will get a Discretionary Bursary if one of the following applies to you:

- you receive Free School Meals
- your family income is £20,000 or less
- your family income is slightly above £20,000 under special circumstances

Eligibility

You must:

- be at least 16 and under 19 on 31 August 2022
- meet the residency requirements. We can check this for you if you are unsure
