Kenny Imafidon is a journalist, author and co-founder of the research company Clearview which focuses on diverse and under represented communities.

"Every saint has a past, and every sinner has a future!" Captivating, heart-wrenching, poignant but most of all... real. *That Peckham Boy* is me, you or any Black boy in the UK. It is a story of redemption, grace and courage. It really emphasises the point that you are not a product of your environment, but you can use it to push you to your greatness. *That Peckham Boy* truly is about growing up, getting out and giving back. It is about a young Peckham boy who is a star student by day and drug dealer by night- until he is accused of a murder he did not commit. Three things that really touched me in Kenny Imafidons book was that we can decide the life we want to lead and that our stories can change with the actions we take and that your name is your power. No one can ever diminish it or take it away from you. Masterpiece!

The Dancer Upstairs by Nicholas Shakespeare
