Study Space

Ensure students have a suitable study space that should include:

- A proper place to work a desk, kitchen table etc
- A place to store resources in an organised way folders/equipment etc
- Quiet! No distractions No TV, music or people!
- No Mobile Phones or Social Networking Sites

Keep letters/booklets/school correspondence safe



Rest

- To prepare the body and brain for the stresses and strains of revision and exams, ensure that students have a regular sleep patterns - getting enough sleep so that they are not tired.
- Remove distractions from sleeping spaces mobile phones, tablets, X Box controllers etc.
- Encourage sports and exercise




The most effective ways to revise...

... according to neuroscientists!

Plan your days

Before starting your revision, pick up a calendar and plan all your days. Keep in mind that it's better to study small chunks of each subject and repeat it after a few days, then spend a long time on a single subject on one day and never doingit again



Use drawings and colours

When writing notes and summaries, try not to use too many words. It's much easier to understand something if it has colours, drawings, diagrams, timelines, arrows, etc. You don't need to be an artist to be able to add visual elements to your revision. A common example of this technique is mind maps.

Test yourself

Reading notes and watching videos is ok for a quick recap. But to get top grades, you need "desirable difficulties". That is, you need to challenge yourself when studying. For that, spend most of your revision time practising questions. Good sources of questions are past papers and free revision websites.





Explain things out loud

Sometimes you may think you understand something, but you'll only know for sure if you explain it out loud. That will force you to make sense of all information and connect the bits and pieces together. A good strategy is to try to explain the content to your grandparents!

Homework & Revision

- Students should be using their exam materials to 'review' learning and complete independent revision.

What is work experience?

- A work experience placement is a period of time spent in a working environment.
- It is an opportunity to learn about a particular job or area of work by your child experiencing it for themselves
- It should be a high quality and meaningful experience.
- Work experience can be a potential route to employment when vacancies arise.
- The aim is to help your child by preparing them for entering the world of work.



At the end of July, all Year 10 students will be going out of school on a week of Work Experience.

Dates: Monday 10th July to Friday 14th July

There will be no normal lessons that week and most students will be expected to be on placement with an employer





Work experience: a parent's guide

Why do we want your child to go out on work experience?

How will work experience benefit me in my career choices?

- Make informed choices try out an area of work 1.
 that they are interested in to see if they enjoy it. It
 can also help them to find out what you don't enjoy! 2.
- Find out about jobs and industry sectors they hadn't considered or weren't aware of before
- Get an idea of what its like to work in their chosen 3.
 work environment and what would be expected of them
- Stand out from the crowd work experience shows 4.
 potential employers their ambition and gives them a 5.
 chance to get to know your child
- Understand the relevance of their current learning and how it relates to the workplace and getting a job, which can help motivate them to achieve their learning goals

How will work experience benefit me in my personal development?

- Identify their strengths and weaknesses and the skills they already have
- Learn new skills and improve others such as teamwork and problem solving. They can get real examples to add to their CV
- Develop their social skills meeting and talking to new and different people, from workplace colleagues to their potential boss!
- Develop independence e.g. travelling to work
- Gain confidence and feel proud of what they achieved



Sourcing a Placement

Do I need to find a placement myself?

If they can find a placement themselves then they can do but we will also be using a company to support us in finding them a placement.

Students can collect a form from their tutor or collect one at the end to complete and bring back in to school



If a placement has been found for my child, what is the next step?

- From Wednesday onwards, your child will receive a letter, which will outline to them
 where they have been placed. It will also give them information what they need to do
 next.
- They will need to:
- 1. Read the placement information sheet carefully and make sure that they keep the document safe
- 2. Contact the employer using the details in the letter to say that they have received the information and they are looking forward to attending. There will be a sample email that they can send in the cover letter. Note If a student does not contact the employer to say thank you, they may cancel the placement



What happens whilst my child is on their placement week?

- Students will attend their placement every day and must arrive on time it is important that they check how they are getting to the placement and that they leave with enough time to get there
- They will need to contact the employer the week before the confirm what time they need to arrive, what they need to wear and lunchtime arrangements
- Whilst your child is out on placement a member of staff will visit or contact the employer and your child to check in with them and see how they are getting on
- During the week, your child will also have to complete a work experience journal, which they will reflect upon when they return to school in the final week of term
